At a time when our world seems to be weary and carrying so many heavy burdens, we invite those of you who feel ready to return to our beautiful sanctuary to attend a simple service of refreshment for your souls on Sundays from 10-10:30 a.m. Because we need to limit the amount of time we are in an enclosed space together, the Church Building Reopening Committee, in conversation with Pastor Ruth, is designing a beautiful 20-30 minute worship celebration that will include those elements that are best shared in community: joys, concerns, prayer, communion, instrumental, and possibly special music. Pastor Ruth will continue to provide both manuscript copies of her sermon as well as preach on Facebook Live that can be used in addition to our in-person worship services. These will also be delivered to all those who are not on the internet. Over the coming weeks, we will be monitoring Covid-19 in our community as we also work to get sufficient internet service and the technology needed to be able to later move to a longer service that will be videoed in its entirety. Dear Church Family and Friends,

How are you all doing? While I have been able to connect with many of you on the phone, do occasional limited visitation, Zoom with some of you during our sweet Wednesday evening gatherings with the adults and Sunday afternoon gatherings with the children, and actually see some of you in real live person (albeit physically distanced and behind our masks or face shields) during our Sunday morning Outdoor Worship gatherings, I so miss being able to see everyone in our sanctuary on Sundays and in various small groups and other activities during the week. I especially miss being able to visit our homebound and those who live in assisted living facilities. It's wearing on me, as I'm sure it is on many of you. I'm excited, though, that we hope to be able to open up our sanctuary for thirty minutes on Sunday mornings beginning in August!

Now that we are entering the fifth month in Kentucky of a global pandemic, we are realizing that many of the hopes we had to return to "business as usual" will not happen soon. In fact, I've heard some scientists recently use baseball metaphors saying that we might think of ourselves as being in the second or third inning of a nine-inning game of the <u>first</u> pandemic wave. Innings have various characteristics and emotions attached to them. During the first inning or two, as you operate with a certain strategy, you might find yourself ahead and can have feelings of optimism that you are going to win. But then in the third inning your opposing team strikes you out and you realize that you have to shift your strategy.

During the first inning or two of the pandemic in the life of our congregation, we operated with realism coupled with a kind of naïve optimism that we would return to "church as usual," even within a month or two. After all, Kentucky was doing a good job of "flattening the curve," businesses were starting to reopen (albeit much more slowly than many would have liked), daycares were opening, people were starting to go out to restaurants again. Churches were starting to reopen: some with strict guidelines and others without any. Yet this third inning is showing that in our rush back to normalcy we may have been moving too quickly and too optimistically. In fact, I belong to a number of clergy groups around the country where so many ministers have had to close their sanctuaries shortly after opening. Some because there have been Covid-19 cases related to worship attendance (even where there were strict distancing and mask requirements); others because Covid-19 cases began increasing again in their communities. After shifting an entire service from online back to in-person, they had to shift them online again.

Finding ourselves in what may well be only the third inning of a nine-inning first wave of the pandemic, our Church Buildings Reopening Committee and I have been praverfully considering what we can offer at this time of uncertainty when we humbly stand before an equal opportunity virus whose aim it is to infect everyone it can. This calls for an ability and willingness to respect science, set aside previous notions of "church as usual," and imagine new ways of operating, which may not resemble what other churches in our community are doing. Since the virus limits the amount of time people should be in an enclosed space together (the longer you are exposed to the aerosols that linger far longer than previously thought, the more dangerous they are), we realize that we should limit any time together in the sanctuary to **less** than 30 minutes. This leaves the question of what are the most important spiritual activities and practices when there is such precious little time to be together in our beautiful sanctuary. My view is that they are those that are best done and enhanced when in community with others: the sharing of joys and concerns, prayer, communion, the enjoyment of spiritual music that elevates our souls to God. Our plan is to open up our sanctuary on Sundays from 10-10:30 a.m., beginning in August. We will be calling this service "Simplicity Sunday," with the hopes that it will provide refreshment for your souls during this challenging time we live in.

I, of course, will continue to provide the best sermons I possibly can (with occasional help from my wonderful husband Russ). My messages over these past months have been designed to be a kind of combination Sunday School class and sermon in one as I've tried to provide some scriptural and theological substance to what I am doing. This is in response to those of you who have said how much you miss Sunday School and our small groups as well during this period of time. However, at a time when we have to limit worship to less than thirty minutes and provide the most important communal elements, it seems best to parcel out the preaching / teaching components of worship. I encourage those of you who would like read or listen to my messages to do so on your own either through the emailed or hand delivered sermons or by listening to them on Facebook live. Until we can resume regular length services, we will have to move forward in a hybrid manner. Part of the worship experience will be offered on Sunday mornings in our sanctuary beginning in August; part of the worship experience will be offered for you to do on your own. For those of you who will choose to continue to stay at home until you feel it is safer to return to our sanctuary, you may continue to use your at-home worship services and additional materials that will be emailed out or delivered to your homes.

There are definite benefits to the kind of "hybrid service" we are proposing. First, it allows us to take the necessary time to work toward being able to have the means to livestream our service in the future. Second, it allows for the necessary flexibility to make course corrections along the way. After all, should we have a really bad spike of Covid-19 infections, it is much easier to decide not to have an in-person worship celebration and move to outside worship again when what you are offering is a more limited worship experience than when you have moved the entire worship experience back to an in-person event. We look forward to moving forward in this more flexible, experimental way, knowing we may need to shift our strategy going forward.

In closing, I want to mention that, in addition to the externals, there also seems to be a spiritual shift when one is in the third inning. I'm sensing that initially it felt as though we were collectively in a kind of PTSD (post traumatic stress disorder) almost Twilight Zone kind of moment, stressed if not even somewhat traumatized by all the changes in the world around us. Now, in this third inning, I'm feeling a kind of spiritual nudging that my friend Michele Tamaren describes not as PTSD but as PTG or "Post Traumatic Growth." Michele identifies the five factors of PTG as: appreciation of life, relationship with others, new possibilities in life, personal strength, and spiritual change. This is a stage where one has accepted what has been and now is open to new growth and possibilities. In fact, I'm sensing that many people are even excited about the challenges that lie before us because they offer new opportunities to prayerfully and boldly reimagine who and what we are. Instead of looking backward to what has been, to "church as usual," I challenge our congregation instead to embrace our position on the third inning of the playing field of life with faith-filled optimism, radical hope, and compassionate courage as we accept the changes brought by the pandemic and other social unrest as a creative moment to usher in new ways of being church both together and in our world. New and wonderful things already are happening as God's Spirit moves among us! And remember that, while we might only be in the third of a nine-inning game, God is in the stands cheering us on! We will be victorious! Carry on!

From the Church Buildings Reopening Committee

July 7, 2020

Greetings from the Church Building Reopening Committee:

At our June 16 meeting, chair Judy Lyle reported that 47 surveys were returned, a number that represents approximately 70 congregants as only one survey per household was requested. A key question on the survey asked who would return to the sanctuary for the Sunday service when we reopen: 55% indicated they would "very likely" do so, an encouraging response.

Pastor Ruth indicated the need for sufficient internet service and additional technology in the sanctuary to continue providing the worship opportunities we've offered our homebound members during the Pandemic. John Hughes, Rob Clause, Mark Dycus, and Donnie Hendrix have graciously agreed to serve on this committee.

Jean Bennett, after exploring several options for the serving of communion, recommended that one individual fill the communion trays with cups of grape juice to be handed to congregants as they enter the sanctuary. To minimize touching, individuals will be asked to provide their own bread (or crackers). Communion will be moved to the beginning of the service with one elder presiding at the table.

John Roark and Tony Van Dyke have been monitoring the external benchmarks related to the number of COVID-19 cases in our community to see whether we can safely reopen.

To reduce the amount of time indoors, the committee recommends a 30-minute service: eliminating group singing since this is a major way that COVID-19 can be spread and providing collection plates at the entry and exit door should help us reach this goal.

We are delighted that Jennifer Donnelly has offered to resume Worship and Wonder in the large room on the third floor of the Education Building. (Allison Willis has a lowered immune system that may prevent her returning for a period of time.)

As survey respondents overwhelmingly favored—and in keeping with the CDC guidelines and recommendations from the Kentucky Council of Churches, and our denomination—attendees will be expected to wear masks, practice social distancing (the entrance and exit door and pews will be marked to ensure compliance), and wipe restroom surfaces after each use.

Because considerable effort is required to complete the aforementioned tasks, the reopening committee needs additional help! Please contact one of the following chairs to offer suggestions and assistance:

Our Church's Heritage

Remembering Our Heritage

The First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Murray, KY, was built on a "firm foundation" (Matthew 7:24-27 and 16:18-19). The present building in which the sanctuary is located was constructed and dedicated October 08, 1905. This site and physical structure has been a blessed gathering place for the Church which bases its spiritual foundation on the Trinity: Creator, Christ and Holy Ghost. Many storms of life have been weathered here and each has contributed to the spiritual growth and development, not only of the congregation as a whole, but individually as members of the body of Christ.

My family has been richly blessed to have had a heritage in the Disciples of Christ which began in 1903 when my dad's mother, Edna Shultz (Dublin), gave her life to Christ at the age of 14 at a Disciples of Christ revival meeting somewhere under a tent in Graves County. After she was married and living in Mayfield, KY, she joined the First Christian Church (DOC) (our sister church at 121 South 9th St.,Mayfield, KY). My grandfather, Fred L. Dublin, from a family of the Methodist faith, was baptized in the same service (1922) that my dad was baptized at the age of ten years. The family moved to Murray and transferred their membership to First Christian Church of Murray. My and my sister Barbara's mom, Cordie Maie Faust Dublin, transferred her membership from the Paris, TN First Baptist Church where she had grown up. Barbara and I grew up within our congregation and were baptized at the same service during a "preaching mission" in April 1956.



Only after our mom had passed away and with loving concern, Barbara transferred her membership to the church where she worships near her home (Trinitarian Congregational Church in Concord, MA). She and her husband, Charles Schiappa, share an interfaith marriage (he is Catholic); thus, they share worship services with both churches. Barbara D. Schiappa is the author of *MIXING, Catholic-Protestant Marriage in the 1980's, A Guidebook for Couples and Families*, published by Paulist Press.

It was November 1956 when this beautiful building we know as the First Christian Church Sanctuary in Murray suffered a major fire. The funeral for the late Don McCord's father had been held with a large congregate of members and friends and, shortly after the group left to travel to the cemetery, the furnace exploded and the massive fire was devastating to the structure and to the congregation. God had led this group of Christians through the construction of what is now our Educational Building. Following the fire, worship services were held for a few Sundays in the auditorium at Murray High School (now the Murray Middle School). Mr. W. B. Moser, an Elder who was also our MHS Principal, and his wife, sat in front of us.

I have listened to a number of stories about the "near tragedy" of this fire and how our Elders and other members worked, spiritually, physically, and mentally, led by God to tear out the damage and reconstruct the building as what we recognize today. The late James Rudy Allbritten (I believe he was the Board Chairman at the time of the fire) father of Lynda Houck, told me lots of stories about how challenging the restoration work was for everyone. He said the guys physically dug out the debris from the basement with shovels and picks and were so overwhelmed and tired they even "cussed," but knew God would understand and forgive.

This "pandemic of 2020" reminds me of the challenges this congregation has endured and survived. First Christian Church (DOC) has withstood many storms within the leadership as well as within the physical structure. Now, because of the COVID virus we have been forced to physically distance ourselves from each other, to worship from home, to try to continue teaching our children from home but even in this we are not alone. As long as we are connected, we are not separated from Christ, we are spiritually together, one church family led by our Creator, Christ and Holy Ghost. May God bless us with compassion, gentleness, wisdom and concern for all during this difficult time.

SHARING STORIES ABOUT RACE IN AMERICA

"So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." ~ Genesis 1:27 (NRSV)

Last year our congregation was given numerous opportunities to explore issues related to systemic racism, including an educational mission trip to Alabama to better understand its historic roots. Little could we have imagined, just one year after our trip to Alabama, the protests and riots that would break out in the aftermath of the killing of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and others, along with heated discussions over confederate statues and monuments, including the Robert E. Lee monument in our court square. Fortunately, in our community, the conversations have been largely respectful and we hope they will continue to be so.

To continue addressing issues of race in our nation, we are grateful that congregant Robert McAllister is willing to share with us his experiences of being the white father of three adopted black children and one white child, whom he raised here in Calloway County. Additionally, Pastor Ruth's close friend, Dawn Thierry, is willing to candidly describe what it was like to grow up as the daughter of a white mother and black father, raised by her black grandmother in Illinois but attending a predominantly white parochial school, which has allowed her to experience life from a unique perspective. Can the effects of systemic racism also be felt in Calloway County where we live? Bob McAllister will share the story of how he and his first wife Robyn adopted and raised four children (three African American daughters and one white son). Initially, Bob and Robyn lived in numerous locations while both serving in the military, which was made up of people from all walks of life and where racism, while not totally absent, was not tolerated. They were concerned when they eventually moved the family to Calloway County, KY. Bob will share stories of what it was like to raise his children in this community where they experienced both acceptance from most and some forms of racism by others on a few occasions. Overall, his entire family has been warmly received by all communities of people they have come in contact with. Bob says that "It's as if we have been able to successfully marginalize the race issue!"

Bob McAllister, a member of First Christian Church, proudly served in the U.S. Army. He first served as an Armor Officer and Aeroscout Pilot/Instructor Pilot for 8 ½ years and then went on to fly for the Coast Guard for another 12 ½ years until his retirement. His first wife Robyn of 32 years (deceased), also a U.S. Army Officer, served in the Signal Corps. Together they adopted and raised four children. Bob is enjoying his retirement years in Murray with his wife, Celeste.

Dawn Thierry has graciously agreed to make herself vulnerable, answer questions, and honestly share what it was like to grow up as the biracial daughter of a black father and white mother in west central Illinois in the 1960-70s. While these stories from her own personal history might make many people uncomfortable (and truth be told they should!), hopefully they will spur us to greater awareness and compassion, ultimately leading to concrete action in creating a more just society.

Dawn Thierry was born in west central Illinois in 1960 to a white mother and a black father. The landmark civil rights U.S. Supreme Court "Loving v. Virginia" case had not yet been decided. Interracial marriage, though legal in Illinois, was not permitted in all states in the USA. Dawn's parents divorced when she was four and, from that point on, she lived mostly with her black paternal grandmother. She was educated primarily in Catholic schools, where she was one of the only black students. Her faith was influenced by attendance at her grandmother's African American congregation on Sundays. After beginning her college degree at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College, Dawn went on to get her associate degree in nursing in 1983 in Galesburg, IL, followed by her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Tennessee Technological University in Cookeville, TN, in 1991. She has worked as an RN at the Cookeville Regional Medical Center since 1997, primarily as a charge nurse. Dawn also is a yoga instructor at Synergy Mind and Body Institute and is a master quilter and knitter. Dawn is married to TTU art professor emeritus Ward Doubet and she has two adult children.
